Mentoring Committee: Chair, Dr. Jim Korn, Psychology

This committee is charged with developing mentoring services and programs. Our primary audience is new and pre-tenured faculty, but we will consider how to serve graduate students ing through research. We are embarkand other faculty. Mentoring should concern not only teaching, but also the whole academic person, including service and research, and how these are balanced. We intend to be proactive in presenting ourselves to faculty. This can happen through public presentations, and invitations to informal social gatherings such as lunch and discussion groups. We want to relate to others as colleagues who provide support and guidance at any time, not only when someone has a problem. Ordinarily we should not require anyone to be mentored. We also hope to help others develop mentoring skills and become part of a mentoring community.

The Research & Grants **Committee:**

Chair, Dr. Doris Rubio, Research Methodology

The Research and Grants committee is excited about the upcoming year. Three primary goals drive this Committee. Our first goal is to evaluate the effectiveness of CTE. With a variety of objectives, we plan on providing the CTE with data documenting their success. The CTE has been in existence for 9 years. During those years, the CTE has significantly contributed to the success of teaching on two different levels, both with faculty and graduate students. We would like to document this success. Our first course of business will be to survey previous attendees of the faculty portfolio retreat to determine how faculty have used the

The graduate students who participate in the Certificate in University Teaching Skills also need to be surveyed in order to document the success of that program. Potential areas of improvement in CTE services may also surface as a result of this process.

The second goal of the committee is to document the effectiveness of teaching on this goal by conducting a comprehensive literature review on effective teaching practices. This literature review would be available to the entire Saint Louis University community and could serve as an informative paper as to what techniques and practices are the most effective in teaching.

For the third goal of the committee, we would like to make available potential grants for faculty who would like to evaluate their teaching. We are in the process of searching the internet for innovative grants that would be available for faculty. We would like to serve as a resource in this capacity by making these grants known to faculty and helping faculty obtain these grants. Other committees of the CTE would also be available to assist faculty in evaluating their teaching in order to fulfill the grant.

With these three primary goals, the **Research and Grants Committee** has much work awaiting them this coming year. We are excited about the outcomes of our work. We look forward to working together as well as working with the other committees of the CTE in order to continue helping faculty and graduate students become the best teachers possible.

Technology Committee: Chair, Dr. Mary Stephen Reinert CTE

Members of CTE's Technology Advisory Committee work closely with the chair of the committee to identify information gained from this workshop. teaching and technology needs of faculty members and graduate assistants that the center can address. This committee is discussing ways of facilitating assessment of student learning throughout the university. Methods of delivering information about assessment to faculty might include doing workshops for the designated assessment coordinators in each college, discussion of assessment techniques with new faculty during their orientation, and continuing workshops throughout the year on classroom assessment techniques.

Program Committee: Chair, Dr. Steve Wernet, School of Social Service

This committee's immediate task has been planning the Fall 2001 schedule of Effective Teaching Seminars. This year, some sessions will be located on the Health Sciences Campus to improve accessibility of CTE services to the entire SLU Community. Longerrange programming plans include revising the Certificate in University Teaching Skills program for faculty participants and developing a core curriculum for the Certificate requirements.

The Technology Corner by Dr. Mary Stephen, Assistant Director and Coordinator of Technology and Learning



In July, I completed my first vear as assistant director and coordinator of technology and learning for the Reinert CTE, and

what an adventure it has been! My job description revolves around developing programs to provide support for faculty members and teaching assistants in integrating technology effectively in teaching. This column is an attempt to let you know what we accomplished during the past year and to give you a preview of what is planned for the coming year.

A highlight of the year was the completion in October of the Technology and Learning Laboratory, a state-ofthe-art facility for use by faculty members and graduate assistants interested in experimenting with ways to integrate technology into teaching. This facility, which was funded in part by the Danforth Foundation, combines Level III classroom equipment with a wireless network of 16 laptop computers, a printer, a digital sender and moveable furniture. The Center offers a variety of technologyrelated seminars for faculty and graduate assistants in the lab, which is housed in Verhaegen 212. The seminar schedule is available on the Center's website. In addition, departments use the lab for faculty meetings that involve technology use.

Collaboration has been a major theme this year. The Center collaborated with the School of Nursing to bring a series of four technology teleconferences to the campuses last year and will be alert for similar opportunities

this year. The Center collaborates with ITS and with the libraries on many activities. The Sixty Minutes for Technology series (http:// sixtyminutes.slu.edu) is one outgrowth of this collaboration. The series will return again this year with sessions offered on both campuses. The Center and ITS developed a series of workshops on technology and collaboration which was offered during the summer. The Center will again new content added monthly. co-sponsor the Faculty Winter Technology Institute with ITS. This year's Institute is scheduled during the week begin my second year at the Center. of January 7th, 2002.

Last spring, the Center launched a faculty technology mentor program. This exciting initiative uses faculty members experienced in integrating technology into their teaching as mentors for faculty members interested in integrating technology for the first time or in new ways into their teaching. The Center is grateful to three very experienced Saint Louis University faculty members Teresa Johnson, Department of Modern and Classical Languages, J. J. Mueller, S. J., Department of Theological Studies, and Laura Stuetzer, Physician Assistant Education, who have agreed to be our first mentors. These faculty members bring enthusiasm and a broad range of experiences in integrating technology into their teaching. We invite you to take advantage of their expertise. The starting of such a faculty technology mentoring program has long been a dream of Don Brennan. Dean of the Graduate School and Associate Provost.

CTE and ITS have created a website, www.slu.edu/edtech that will be available beginning this fall. The

website is designed to highlight the many ways that faculty are using technology in teaching at Saint Louis University and to provide additional resources and ideas for using technology in teaching. The site includes a calendar that lists technology-related faculty and graduate assistant professional development opportunities being offered across the campuses.
