Announcing the 2002 FACULTY TEACHING PORTFOLIO RETREAT—APRIL 5-6

Each year since 1998, the Center for Teaching Excellence has sponsored a faculty retreat providing an intensive workshop for teaching portfolio development. The 5th Annual Faculty Development Portfolio Retreat will be held Friday and Saturday, April 5 and 6, 2002. The retreat will again take place at the peaceful and scenic Cedar Creek Conference Center (www.cedarcreekcenter. com) in New Haven, Missouri, which is about an hour from the University. This retreat is designed for non-tenured, tenure track faculty and has a central theme of "Building Your Teaching Portfolio". The workshop will be presented by last year's workshop directors James Groccia and Marilyn Miller of the Program for Excellence in Teaching at the University of Missouri.

During past retreats, participants worked to develop strategies for documenting teaching

achievements including teaching innovations Durham, Mike Grady and Sharon Homan. and improvements. Such documentation showcasing teaching serves not only to further faculty efforts to assess teaching and develop effective pedagogy but also contributes to their preparation for the promotion and tenure review process. This retreat also provides faculty with an opportunity to come together across disciplines as a teaching community for conversation and mentoring. In the past, all participants have left the retreat with at least an initial draft of their teaching portfolio.

The past four retreats have been very well received and positively evaluated by the faculty participants. A recent study was conducted by the CTE Research and Grants Committee to ascertain how previous participants benefited from the Retreat. The Committee is chaired by Doris Rubio and members include Mary Domahidy, Judy

The committee polled a random sample of 55% of past participants by telephone using a semi-structured questionnaire developed by the committee. The sample represented faculty from various schools on both campuses. 92% of the sample completed the telephone interview. The results of the study indicated that participants' expectations for the retreat were met, that most have used the portfolio for the tenure process or midterm review, and that all participants would recommend the retreat to others. Notes from the Steering Committee and Sub-Committees

Assessment Committee:

Chair, Dr. Julie Weissman, Office of Institutional Study

The Assessment Committee is currently focusing upon CTE's involvement in assessment. The committee is considering CTE sponsored brown bag luncheons and workshops to foster dialogue among faculty members regarding classroom assessment techniques and course evaluations. In addition the committee supports teleconferencing opportunities for assessment coordinators from each department to learn about new methods of classroom assessment from leaders in the field. Incorporating the topic of assessment into CTE's Effective Teaching Seminar schedule will familiarize and equip graduate students with the tools and techniques required in the classroom. The Assessment Committee looks forward to working with the Program Committee to incorporate assessment topics into the certificate curriculum.

Program Committee:

Chair, Dr. Steve Wernet, School of Social Service

The Program Committee is revising both the structure of and the curriculum for the Certificate in University Teaching Skills. The number of required seminars has been reduced from 10 to 9 with content of the seminars standardized across 9 core topics. The Advisory Board has responded favorably to these changes and feel that the revisions will enhance the quality of the certificate.

The Research & Grants Committee:

Chair, Dr. Doris Rubio, Research Methodology

The Research and Grants Committee has succeeded in completing the Evaluation of the Teaching Portfolio Retreat. We would like to extend a special thanks to all of those participants who gave their feedback of the workshop. We surveyed 24 previous participants of the teaching portfolio retreat. Overall, participants were very satisfied with the retreat. An overwhelming number of positive comments were made about the benefits of the retreat and of having a portfolio (specifically in regards to tenure/promotion). Participants do feel a need to spend more time working on the portfolio, but have not been able to due to time constraints. Perhaps if more recognition by administration is given to those who maintain a portfolio, participants would feel more motivated to make the time to keep the portfolio updated. One suggestion made by several participants is to have a similar retreat that focuses on research.

The Committee is now beginning to embark on another exciting project. We are engaging in new research on the best practices in the classroom. We would like to study previous recipients of teaching awards inquiring about their teaching practices. The project is still in the infancy stage as we are pursuing potential funding opportunities for this research.

In each newsletter, you will now see a featured section on grant opportunities. With the help of the Office for Research Services, the Committee has complied a list of potential grants for faculty. The Committee thought that a feature in each newsletter would be a great way to disseminate information on potential grant prospects.

Mentoring Committee:

Chair, Dr. Jim Korn, Psychology

The mentoring committee is working to help new faculty develop collegial relationships with senior faculty outside their own departments. At a dinner gathering in early October, twelve new faculty asked to have more information about developing mentoring relationships. Members of the committee are contacting these faculty to arrange informal meetings. We also are scheduling social events for small groups to discuss the experiences new faculty are having in their first vear at SLU. Last week seven of us met for breakfast in Bannister House. Two more events will be scheduled for the Spring semester.

The committee members are Jim Dowdy (math), Louise Flick (Nursing), Elizabeth Kolmer (American Studies), Jim Korn (Psychology), who chairs this committee, Belden Lane (Theological Studies), and Pat Welch (Economics). Any new or seasoned faculty member is welcome to contact anyone on this committee to talk about mentoring.

The Technology Corner

December 12, 2001 marked the 10th anniversary of the first U.S. website, a three-line page that went online at Stanford Linear Accelerator Center. The Internet has come a long way since that first U.S. website, and this anniversary provides an occasion to reflect on where we are now, particularly with respect to the Internet and teaching. I recently read a study on the Internet in which 71 of 259 living Nobel Laureates were asked to predict where the Internet would take us over the next 20 years. Princeton Survey Research Associates prepared Education, Innovation & The Internet: Nobel Laureates Look To The Future, in celebration of the 100th anniversary of the Nobel Prizes. While an overwhelming 92 percent of the Nobel Laureates view inadequate educational opportunities and illiteracy as major problems continuing to face mankind in 20 years, 91 percent believe the Internet will increase educational opportunities in the future, 95 percent think the Internet will help researchers educate people about their work, and 87 percent believe the Internet will have a positive effect on improving education. What impact is the Internet having on our teaching in 2002? This semester CTE will be offering a seminar and workshop to focus on this question. In March, CTE is joining with the School of Nursing, Qualitative Research Committee, and Department of Psychology to sponsor a series of talks and workshops by Vincent Hevern, S.J. of Lemoyne College. Please join us on March 20 as Father Hevern explores the potential of the Internet in teaching in his address, "Teaching and the Web: Exploring the Human Digital Ecology." A link to Fr. Continuing Faculty Reflections on September 11th

Dark Matter By Vincent Casaregola, English

At the heart of fire, the core of light, of flame lies the heavy center, the grave, dark point, hiding, infinitesimal, almost unseen, like the slightest ink mark punctuating hope, and yet blank space as well, a gap or gateway into someone else's brooding galaxy.

Space and time conspire to play tricks on eye and mind, and size is but appearance where distances deceive; hiding within the slender vein, virus with virus lie hatching plots, while deep within the cell itself, the molecules mutate and collude to devastate the blood, the marrow, and the bone.

Now, I am told, the universe holds mostly dark matter, and energy darker still, secrets unrevelaed to light, hiding not only in some cosmic cloud, but even in the slightest speck of dust; within the dust itself, infinite space unfurls in deep, throbbing darkness so vast the mind breaks apart in futile hopes to hold and shape this thought.

The secret, then, is infinite space curled and wound within each grain of sand or fleck of dirt, and each one filled with the arc of time, the ache of voiceless cries.

The mystery of every solid object is the emptiness inside—the gaps within the walls, between the floors, and the thin air of weakness echoing across the hidden space—apparitional buildings, inevitable towers, nor more than elegant shells, you, too, succumb, delicately shudder and fall, floor upon floor, into and through the strange indelible cloud that both rises and falls, where every flake of ash, every mote of dust holds and becomes its own dark universe, silent, mournful, aghast.
