This is a short check list of possible external funders who support research in the Humanities. The list is not intended to be exhaustive, but it is indicative of some of the external funding opportunities that are available.

1. American Academy in Berlin

Berlin Prize Fellowships (Semester-Long Residential)

A center for advanced study in the humanities, public policy, social sciences, and the arts. About twenty-six Berlin Prize Fellowships are conferred each year by an independent selection committee.

Round-trip airfare to Berlin, Housing at the Hans Arnhold Center, Partial board, and stipend of \$5,000 / month.

2. American Council of Learned Societies (ACLS)

Fellowship (9-12 Months Residential)

ACLS invites research applications from scholars in all disciplines of the humanities and related social sciences. The ultimate goal of the project should be a major piece of scholarly work by the applicant, which can take the form of a monograph, articles, digital publication(s), critical edition, or other scholarly resources.

Up to \$40,000 for Assistant Professor and career equivalent, up to \$50,000 for Associate Professor and career equivalent; and up to \$70,000 for full Professor and career equivalent.

3. American Council of Learned Societies (ACLS)

ACLS/New York Public Library Fellowships (Academic Year Residential)

ACLS may award residential fellowships in conjunction with The New York Public Library's Dorothy and Lewis B. Cullman Center for Scholars and Writers, because this is a joint fellowship, applicants for ACLS/NYPL residential fellowships must also apply to the Dorothy and Lewis B. Cullman Center for Scholars and Writers at the NYPL. The Center provides opportunities for up to 15 fellows to explore collections in the NYPL's Stephen A. Schwarzman Building.

The stipend for ACLS/NYPL fellowships will be \$70,000, regardless of the applicant's faculty rank or rank equivalency.

4. American Council of Learned Societies (ACLS)

ACLS Project Development Grants (Project Support)

ACLS Project Development Grants support projects from faculty at teaching-intensive institutions. Applicants from these institutions who are not selected for fellowships, but present particularly promising proposals may be awarded a grant of \$5,000 to help advance their projects.

5. John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation

Guggenheim Fellowships (Non-Residential Grant)

For advanced professionals in all fields (natural sciences, social sciences, humanities, creative arts), except the performing arts, to further the development of scholars and artists by assisting them to engage in research in any field of knowledge and creation in any of the arts. The Foundation receives approximately 3,000 applications each year and approximately 175 Fellowships are awarded each year.

6. Rockefeller Foundation

Bellagio Center Residency (Short-Term Residential Fellowship)

The Bellagio Residency program offers scholars, artists, thought leaders, policymakers and practitioners a serene setting conducive to focused, goal-oriented work and establish new connections with fellow residents, across a stimulating array of disciplines and geographies. Of particular interest are innovative projects that address one or more of the Rockefeller Foundation's five interconnected issue areas: basic survival safeguards, global health, climate and environment, urbanization, social and economic security.

7. National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH)

Collaborative Research Grants (Team Research Support)

Collaborative Research Grants support original research undertaken by a team of two or more scholars, for full-time or part-time activities for periods of at least one year up to a maximum of three years.

\$25,000 to \$100,000 per year for up to 3 years

8. National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH)

Digital Humanities Start-up Grants (New Initiative Project Support)

Grant is to encourage innovations in the digital humanities. Proposals should be for the planning or initial stages of digital initiatives in any area of the humanities.

\$5,000 to \$50,000 for up to 18 months

9. National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH)

Digital Humanities Implementation Grants (Partial Project Support)

Designed to fund the implementation of innovative digital-humanities projects that have successfully completed a start-up phase and demonstrated their value to the field. Although

cost sharing is not required in this program, NEH is rarely able to support the full costs of projects approved for funding. In most cases, Digital Humanities Implementation Grants are expected to cover no more than 80 percent of project costs.

\$100,000 to \$325,000 for 1 to 3 years

10. National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH)

Enduring Questions (Course Development Support)

Supports the development of a new course that will foster intellectual community through the study of an enduring question, questions to which no discipline, field, or profession can lay an exclusive claim. The course is to be developed by one or more (up to four) faculty members, but not team taught.

Up to \$25,000 for 18 to 36 months

11. National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH)

Summer Stipends (Project Support)

Supports full-time continuous work on a humanities project for a period of two months. Summer Stipends are awarded to individual scholars. Organizations are not eligible to apply.

12. National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH)

Public Scholar Program (Project Support)

Supports six to twelve months of work on scholarly researched books in the humanities, written in a readily accessible style and addressing significant humanities themes in a way that will appeal to a large audience of general readers. Open to both individuals affiliated with scholarly institutions and to independent scholars, researchers, and writers in any stage of development.

\$5,000 per month

13. National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH)

NEH Fellowship (Project Support)

Supports individuals pursuing advanced research that is of value to humanities scholars, general audiences, or both. Recipients usually produce articles, monographs, books, digital materials, archaeological site reports, translations, editions, or other scholarly resources in the humanities. Fellowships cover periods of six to twelve months with projects at any stage of development.

\$4,200 per month. Maximum stipend is \$50,400 for a twelve-month period.

14. American Antiquarian Society

Fellowships for Creative and Performing Artists and Writers (Short Term Residential Fellowship)

Visiting fellowships for historical research by creative and performing artists, writers, film makers, journalists, and other persons whose goals are to produce imaginative, non-formulaic works dealing with pre-twentieth-century American history. The Society's goal in sponsoring this program is to multiply and improve the ways in which an understanding of history is communicated to the American people.

\$1,850 for four weeks during the calendar year. If staying in Scholar Housing award will be between \$1,150-1,350.

Visiting Academic Research Fellowships (Short-Term Residential)

Visiting fellowships for historical research by scholars holding the Ph.D. or other terminal degree and for doctoral candidates engaged in dissertation research, dealing with pre-twentieth-century American history.

\$1,850 for one-two months during the calendar year. If staying in Scholar Housing award will be between \$1,150-1,350.

16. American Antiquarian Society

AAS-NEH Long-Term Fellowship (Long-Term Residential Fellowship)

Four to twelve month postdoctoral fellowships at AAS, designed to enable scholars to spend an uninterrupted block of time doing research in the AAS library on their projects and discussing their work with others. Mid-career scholars are encouraged to apply.

17. American Association of University Women

Postdoctoral Research Leave Fellowships (Long Term Research Fellowship)

This program provides fellowships for women pursuing full-time study to complete dissertations, conducting postdoctoral research full time, or are working toward earning tenure-track faculty positions or further promotions. Postdoctoral fellowships are available in the arts and humanities, social sciences, and natural sciences. Limited additional funds may be available when matched by the fellow's institution.

18. American Association of University Women

Summer/Short-Term Research Publication Grants (Publication/Research Support)

Intended for tenure-track, part-time, or temporary faculty or new or established scholars and researchers at universities to prepare research for publication. Time must be available for eight consecutive weeks of final writing, editing, and responding to issues raised in critical reviews. Funds cannot be used for undertaking research. Scholars with strong publishing records should seek other funding.

19. American Councils for International Education

Title VIII Research Scholar Program (Full Travel Support)

Funded by the U.S. Department of State's Program for Research and Training on Eastern Europe and the Independent States of the Former Soviet Union (Title VIII), provides full support for faculty seeking to conduct in-country, independent research for three consecutive months to nine consecutive months in Central Asia, Moldova, Russia, the South Caucasus, Southeast Europe, and Ukraine.

Airfare from scholar's home city to host city overseas, visa assistance, housing and living stipend, health insurance of up to \$100,000 per accident or illness.

20. Council of American Overseas Research Centers (CAORC)

Multi-Country Research Fellowship Program for Advanced Multi-Country Research (Overseas Project/Research Support)

This program supports advanced regional or trans-regional research in the humanities, social sciences, or allied natural sciences for U.S. doctoral candidates and scholars who have already earned their PhD. Preference will be given to candidates examining comparative and/or cross-regional research. Applicants are eligible to apply as individuals or in teams. Scholars must carry out research in two or more countries outside the United States, at least one of which hosts a participating American overseas research center. Approximately eight awards will be given.

21. Council of American Overseas Research Centers (CAORC)

COARC/NEH Senior Scholar Fellowship (Short-Term Overseas Fellowship)

Applicants must propose 4 consecutive months of research in an American Overseas Research Center in one of the following countries: Algeria, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Bangladesh, Cambodia, Cyprus, Georgia, Indonesia, Mexico, Mongolia, Morocco, Nepal, Senegal, Sri Lanka or Tunisia. Fields of study include, but are not limited to, history, philosophy, religious studies, literature, literary criticism, and visual and performing arts. Fellowship awards are for a maximum of 4 consecutive months

22. The National Humanities Center

National Humanities Center Fellowships (Long-Term Residential Fellowship)

Offers up to 40 residential fellowships for advanced study in the humanities for September through May. In addition to scholars from all fields of the humanities, the Center accepts individuals from the natural and social sciences, the arts, the professions, and public life who are engaged in humanistic projects. The Center seeks to provide at least half salary and covers travel expenses for Fellows and dependents.

Individually determined. The Center seeks to provide half salary up to \$65,000 with the expectation that a Fellow's home institution will cover the remaining salary. Housing and travel expenses to and from North Carolina are covered.

23. American Academy in Rome

American Academy in Rome Prize (Short or Long-Term Residential Fellowships)

Support innovative and cross-disciplinary work in the arts and humanities. Each year, the prize is awarded to about thirty artists and scholars who represent the highest standard of excellence and who are in the early or middle stages of their careers.

Housing and meals provided. Half-term and full-term fellowships receive stipends of \$16,000 and \$28,000, respectively. Winners of the Two-Year fellowships receive \$28,000 annually.

24. German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD)

Faculty Research Stay Grant

DAAD offers grants for one to three months in all academic disciplines to scholars to pursue research at universities, libraries, archives, institutes or laboratories in Germany. The aim of this particular program is to support short-term research stays and thus promote the exchange of experience and networking amongst colleagues. Grants are awarded for specific research projects and cannot be used for travel only.

EUR 2,000 a month for lecturers and assistant professors and EUR 2,150 a month for associate professors and full professors.

25. New York Historical Society

NEH Fellowship at the New York Historical Society (Long-Term Residential)

One ten-month residency fellowship over a single academic year to work on a major research project that requires resources available at the New-York Historical Society. Open to individuals who have completed their formal professional training and have a strong record of accomplishment within their field; there is no restriction relating to age or academic status of applicants.

Stipend of \$42,000, plus benefits.

26. Bogliasco Foundation

Bogliasco Fellowships (Short-Term Residential)

The Liguria Study Center for the Arts and Humanities welcomes applications from persons doing both creative and scholarly work in the arts (such as Art History, Musicology, Film Criticism, and so on). An approved project is presumed to lead to the completion of an artistic, literary, or scholarly work, followed by publication, performance, exhibition, or other public presentation. Approximately 50 fellowships are awarded each year and are typically a month long.

Living quarters, separate private studios and full board provided.

APS/ IASH in the Humanities Fellowship for Research in Edinburgh (Short-Term Research)

In collaboration with the Institute for Advanced Studies in the Humanities at the University of Edinburgh, the APS offers a visiting fellowship of between 2-4 months for research in Edinburgh in any aspect of the humanities and social sciences.

Award includes travel expenses between the US and the UK, a private office, library and research facilities at the IASH, and a monthly subsistence paid by the APS. Amount will not exceed a maximum of \$6,000.

Long-Term Fellowships (Project Support/Residential)

Fellows have access to the Newberry's wide-ranging and rare archival materials as well as to a lively, interdisciplinary community of researchers, curators, and librarians. Fellowships are intended to support significant works of scholarship that draw on the strengths of the Newberry's collection. Fellowship residencies must take place primarily during the academic year (September through May) for 4 to 9 months.

Applicants must document that their projects have been accepted for publication and provide detailed information regarding the publication and the subvention request.

might choose: at their home institution, or another archive, institute, library, museum, or research center, anywhere in the world. Particular weight is accorded to the project's impact, relevance, and approach as well as expected use of Folger collections.
