Social Media: @slu.fpa The Theatre Program offers a Bachelor of Arts in Theatre that produces graduates who are prepared to enter M.F.A. or M.A. programs in theatre to enter the job market for actors and technicians for theatrical productions, or creatively market their variety of theatre skills for use in non-theatrical venues such as law, training, sales, promotion, marketing and other types of presentation activities.

These goals are accomplished through a combination of theoretical classroom explorations and practical production of plays. The curriculum requires a balanced and broad study of all aspects of theatre with historical, theoretical and skill-based components. The Theatre Program produces a series of plays that challenge students to consider diverse values, viewpoints, and expression of the creative imagination. The collaborative atmosphere among students and faculty members on both the theoretical challenges of classroom projects and the practical realization of our public performances prepare students to present clearly and appropriately their imaginative ideas to others and to make adjustment to their work according to the constructive criticism of faculty mentors.

The practical aspects of producing plays are a direct extension of the classroom activities presented. Theatre majors and minors are formed into a company of actors, designers and technicians that is responsible, with the mentorship and participation of faculty and staff, for all aspects of each departmentally produced work. In keeping with the liberal arts focus of Saint Louis University and a long tradition of undergraduate theatre education, company members are expected to develop a basic level of proficiency and practical knowledge of all aspects of theatre production. The formation of a company allows us to highlight the collaborative nature of theatre and the importance of shared commitment and responsibility in pursuit of a shared goal. Direct participation in production is a requirement for a significant portion of the students' education and it is strongly encouraged that they avail themselves of this opportunity throughout their entire academic career.

Students may complete the Theatre curriculum without audition or portfolio review, though all prerequisites for classes, as designated, still apply. All students pursuing the major in Theatre must also participate in an individual annual review with the Theatre Faculty where the students progress, work habits, and skill level in performance and technical areas will be discussed.

DANCE Minor

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The Dance Program at Saint Louis University offers all students opportunities to study dance as a personal/cultural practice and art form. Dance educates the whole person, sensitizing students to a deeper understanding of self, others and the world, and supporting students toward living a life of balance, integration, vitality, well-being and creativity. Through formal and improvisational dance techniques, choreographic processes, rehearsal/performance practices and an education of historical/cultural contexts, students hone the body as a skillful instrument for expression and communication, and they develop heightened awareness of the human experience.

Offering a curriculum that integrates mind/body/spirit, the Dance Minor teaches students to think with the whole body as an intelligent source for learning, exploration and discovery. The Dance minor curriculum encourages connections between dance and other personal and professional pursuits. Students investigate applications of dance to other areas of study such as theatre, music, education, religious studies, physical therapy, exercise science and health care, etc. Seeking such intersections nurtures critical thinking, leading to the development of novel perspectives that ignite innovation and a creative spirit. Therefore, dance is well suited to inform and support any discipline, worldview or personal goal.
