

### Distinguished Historian of Jews in the Middle Ages to Lecture on Muslim-Jewish Relations in the Medieval Middle East

Professor **Mark Cohen** of Princeton University will deliver a lecture drawing from a lifetime of study on the history of Jews in the Muslim Middle East. The lecture, entitled "The Myth of Muslim Anti-Semitism," will take place on **Tuesday, January 30** at 3:30 p.m. in the Pere Marquette Gallery of DuBourgh Hall. The lecture is free and open to the public. A reception will follow.



Cohen is the Khedouri A. Zildha Emeritus Professor of Jewish Civilization in the Near East at Princeton University. His ground-breaking work with the Cairo Geniza documents has made him one of the most important scholars in the field of medieval Jewish history in the Muslim Middle East. His numerous publications include *Under Crescent and Cross: The Jews in the Middle Ages* (Princeton, 2008), *The Voice of the Poor in the Middle Ages* (Princeton, 2005), and *Jewish Self-Government in Medieval Egypt* (Princeton, 1980).

### Visiting Cambridge Scholar to Examine the Effects of the *Romance of the Rose* on English Literature



Dr. **Philip Knox** of Trinity College, Cambridge, will deliver a lecture on his current research, which explores the effects of the popular French poem, *The Romance of the Rose*, on English writers such as Geoffrey Chaucer, John Gower, and William Langland. The lecture, entitled, "Heresies Against Love: The *Romance of the Rose* in Fourteenth-Century England," will take place on **Monday, March 5** at 3:30 p.m. in Adorjan Hall 142.

Dr. Knox is a University Lecturer and fellow of Trinity College, Cambridge. His publications include *Medieval Thought Experiments: Poetry, Hypothesis, and Experience in the European Middle Ages* (Brepols, 2018).
