# Reinert Center In Review

# March – October 2020

Spring through Fall 2020 at the Reinert Center has paralleled much of the shifts and changes we have seen at the University, in our community, and in our country and the wider world.

In January 2020, the Center's director, Debra Lohe, moved into the role of interim vice president of student development, and the Center's associate director, Gina Merys, added the role of acting director to her duties in order to temporarily fill the gap. We hosted two of our annual, signature events, the Winter Institute (January) and the Ignatian Pedagogy Institute (March).

Even as we discussed ways to incorporate discernment and critical thinking practices into courses on that first day of spring break, the Reinert Center staff were already preparing resources for an emergency move to a remote teaching and learning format. We created the Instructional Continuity page as a space to collect these resources on our website so that faculty could easily access what they needed as they moved into this new teaching situation. We scheduled additional offerings of the Introduction to Online Teaching seminar, created an accelerated version of that seminar, and then scheduled even more of those seminars throughout the summer months serving an unprecedented number of instructors. We quickly learned how to create and facilitate webinars over Zoom, and recreated in-person programming such as discussions and workshops as remote synchronous and asynchronous events.

Before we knew it, the fall semester began. We kicked off Certificate in University Teaching Skills programming, with the naming of the main certificate in that program, the *Principles in University Teaching Skills certificate*, as well as asynchronous versions of the Praxis workshops and remote, synchronous Teaching Essentials workshops. We created remote versions of all of our signature services, including teaching observations and small group instructional feedback sessions. Additionally, we continued creating resources and programming for our theme of Community, including anti-racist pedagogy resources.

Most importantly, we have continued and will continue to serve all of the instructors at Saint Louis University in St. Louis and Madrid. Even though we are not in our office in Pius library, we are available to talk to individuals and groups as we have always been.

The Reinert Center conducted **159** consultations between mid-March and the end of October.




100% rated their consultation as Excellent (87%) or Good (13%)

# Small Group Instructional Feedback (SGIF) sessions\*




\* SGIF offerings were restricted to Asynchronous only this semester. Also, Spring 2020 SGIFs were cancelled once the pandemic set in.

### Programmatic Highlights

#### Introduction to Online Teaching

In 2018, the Reinert Center began offering the Introduction to Online Teaching, a fully-online seminar that provides a pedagogical foundation for Saint Louis University faculty who are new to the online teaching environment. Between 2018 and early 2020, we were averaging 1-2 offerings per semester. In mid-March 2020, when the University closed campus and moved all courses to a remote format, the Reinert Center understood that faculty needed this seminar to be available to them in an unprecedented way.

#### Online Teaching Fellows

The Online Teaching Fellowship opportunity enhances Reinert Center offerings, resources, and support for Saint Louis University faculty teaching fully online courses or courses that will transition to online, as well as courses that have remote students. Additionally, the experience of serving as an Online Teaching Fellow provides SLU faculty with formal experience in educational development, expanding their knowledge in pedagogy and academic technologies.

Fellows conduct one-on-one consultations with faculty in their school/college as well as across the university to answer questions and provide peer-to-peer mentorship in hybrid and online teaching. Fellows also facilitate open discussions each semester on topics currently relevant to SLU instructors on hybrid and online teaching.
