The practice focuses on post-conviction litigation in state and/or federal courts, and students are immersed in hands-on case work supplemented with doctrinal seminars in this complex area of constitutional law and capital defense work. The work entails legal research and writing, case file digesting and analysis, and, during some terms, assistance with client and/or witness interviews conducted in the field by Phillips Black attorneys. Voices for Children https://voices-stl.org/	Students develop their research, organization and investigating skills and participate as part of the staff team to ensure quality representation of abused and neglected children under the jurisdiction of the court. Students work collaboratively within a multi-disciplinary team to advocate for children and interacts regularly with children, co-workers, court personnel, Children's Division, and service providers. Students may appear in court under the supervision of a staff attorney to represent the best interests of children. Students are required to complete CASA training, which is a 16 hour training to be completed at the beginning of the semester. A Rule 13 student practice license is helpful, but it is not required.
