FAKE NEWS & INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL LAW

In a decade defined by fake news, nations have weaponized disinformation to disrupt political, legal, and social systems throughout the world. Specifically, in recent years, government leaders have utilized this disinformation against the International Criminal Court ("ICC") in efforts to deter investigations and prosecutions in politically controversial cases. By focusing on two ongoing examples of disinformation warfare against the ICC by the United States and Israel—two nations currently under investigation by the ICC Prosecutor—this presentation will examine the potentially devastating consequences of disinformation on international criminal law and will identify workable solutions for how the ICC can continue to successfully progress in an era of fake news.



Professor of Law at the University of Louisville, Louis D. Brandeis School of Law. Her scholarly research focuses predominantly on the prosecution of mass atrocities before international and hybrid courts and the use of transitional justice mechanisms in post-conflict and settler societies. She has presented her work on these topics at numerous conferences throughout the United States and the United Kingdom.

Professor Ochs earned her juris doctor summa cum laude from Loyola University New Orleans College of Law, where she served as an editor of the Loyola Law Review and a member of the law school's Willem C. Vis International Commercial Arbitration Moot Team. Following graduation, she clerked for the Honorable Carl J. Barbier on the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Louisiana. She then practiced civil litigation at Simon Peragine Smith & Redfearn, LLP and subsequently at Akerman LLP in New Orleans.

Professor Ochs serves as the Co-Chair of the ABA Section of International Law's International Courts & Judicial Affairs Committee, as well as an advisory board member and newsletter editor of the American Society of International Law's International Courts & Tribunals Interest Group. She also serves as a volunteer International Humanitarian Law Instructor for the American Red Cross and is a certified Trial Monitor with the Clooney Foundation for Justice.
