Course Description:

The course aims at providing a first introduction to Latin Language and Literature through the study of Latin grammar and the translation of short literary texts.

Course Goals and Student Learning Outcomes:

At the end of the course, students will:

- translate simple texts in Latin
- identify Latin basic morphology
- explain some aspects of Roman culture and literature

Week 8: The Future. The comparative and the superlative.
Week 9: Prepositions and preverbs.
Week 10: The Perfect.
Week 11: The Plusperfect.
Week 12: The Subjunctive.
Week 13: The Infinitive. Infinitive clauses.
Week 14: Deponent and Semi-deponent verbs.
