Course Description: This course is designed as an introduction to theory, research methods, and empirical findings in the field of developmental psychology. Special emphasis given to normative psychological development from conception to puberty, including aspects of cognitive, language, social, emotional, and personality development.

Course Goals and Student Learning Outcomes: At the end of the course, students will:

- become familiar with the major concepts related to child development.
- learn to think critically about the major questions and issues that are relevant to developmental psychology today.
- develop an understanding and appreciation of how to *apply* fundamental concepts learned to their everyday lives. For example, concepts discussed in class related to parenting can one day be directly applied in students' interactions with children in their professional and personal lives.
- further develop critical academic skills, such as oral and written communication skills.

Reading Policy: All students are expected to read the textbook BEFORE attending class. You are responsible for the material covered in the chapter, even if it is not discussed in class, unless otherwise specified by the professor.

Notetaking and lecture materials: Power Point presentations will be provided on Blackboard to assist you in notetaking. The Power Points are very thorough, highlight major concepts from the text or other materials, and can

and should be used as a supplement to your text when preparing for an exam. No additional study guides will be provided for exams. The Power Point presentations will be utilized as a starting point for learning and discussion in class, but we will not review every slide due to time constraints, so it is important that you use the slides on Blackboard as well.

Attendance Policy and Class Participation (5% of Course Grade): Students are expected to attend class regularly and to arrive to class *promptly*. You are responsible for all announcements made and/or material covered during class meetings. It is the student's responsibility to stay abreast of any scheduling changes or adjustments to the syllabus that are announced in class. Any unexpected scheduling changes (e.g., class cancellation, change in due date for an assignment, etc.) will be communicated immediately to the class through Blackboard. I will orally take attendance during the Drop/Add period. After this period, your attendance is your responsibility.

This means that there is no magic number of "missed classes" or "excused absences." SLU Madrid policy does not specify *any criteria* for excusing an absence from class, nor is there any guarantee that you will be allowed to make up any work missed during your absence (e.g., quiz or midterm exam). If you must miss class for any reason, you may choose to notify me as a courtesy, but this is not required as there are no "excused absences." If you miss an exam or other major assignment, please notify me as soon as possible to discuss the issue and agree upon the appropriate course of action.

<u>Classroom Environment and Expectations:</u> Classroom discussion is an important part of the learning process, therefore, it is vital to maintain a classroom environment that is respectful and free of discrimination and/or recrimination from peers. Please make every effort to be respectful of others' opinions.

Regarding course content, be aware that we will be discussing topics related to child development that may trigger emotional or psychological distress in some students (e.g., child abuse and maltreatment). Keep this in mind as you make comments or pose questions in class. Furthermore, these difficult issues can be raised in any class meeting, without prior warning. With that in mind, please remember that class is NOT a protected, confidential environment, and the professor cannot guarantee that other students/peers will maintain your confidential information should you choose to share it.

Email and Technology in the Classroom

E-mail: Campus and course announcements will often be handled by e-mail. Students should check their "@slu.edu" e-mail regularly.

The professor will respond to email **between the hours of 9:00 and 6:00 pm.**, **Monday through Friday**. In general, emails are answered within 48 hours. Please be aware that I do not regularly check my SLU email in the evening, so if you send me an email after 6 pm, I may not respond until the next working day, nor will I respond on the weekends.

- INSTRUCTIONS:
 - OPEN BOOK POLICY: Students may use class materials when taking the quiz, but may NOT take the quiz along with another student or share answers for the quizzes with classmates.
 - Chapter 7-SELF STUDY: This chapter will not be reviewed in class. The
 quiz is designed to promote and assess your independent reading
 comprehension skills.
 - **NOTIFICATION:** As quizzes are posted on Blackboard, you will be notified that they are available via your SLU email when the quiz is "online".
 - **TIME-LIMITED**: Time limit will be based on the length and extent of the material.
 - AVAILABILITY: Quizzes will be available for SEVEN calendar days (one week). After this time, the quiz will no longer be accessible via Blackboard. Given that students have ample time to complete a quiz, absolutely no make-up quizzes will be provided, under any circumstances. If you fail to complete the quiz within the time-frame allotted, you will receive a score of 0.
 - ATTEMPTS: You will have only one attempt to complete the quiz on Blackboard, and it must be completed in one sitting (ie., you may not save it and go back to it later). If you lose connectivity during the quiz, your incomplete quiz will be submitted and scored. Thus, it is highly recommended that you complete the online quizzes using a reliable internet connection (e.g., a computer at the university computer lab).
- MIDTERM (25% of Course Grade): The midterm exam may consist of any combination of multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions. Any material presented in class, in the text, or in assigned readings/activities may appear on the exam. Chapters included: 2,3,4,6,8,9
 - Students who miss the midterm exam for a true emergency (e.g. hospital admission, death in the family) must contact the professor immediately to evaluate the situation. The professor will then decide if a makeup exam is warranted. Under no circumstances will make up exams be given for

travel conflicts or other personal commitments/issues. Please be advised that you will be required to show documentation of the emergency.

- **FINAL EXAM** (25% of Course Grade): The final exam may consist of any combination of multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions. Any material presented in class, in the text, or in assigned readings/activities may appear on the exam. Chapters included: **10**, **11**, **12**, **13**, **14**, **15**, **and Special Topic Discussion** (Child Maltreatment)
 - *Final exam times are determined by the Registrar and cannot be changed. Travel of any kind is NOT a valid excuse for missing a midterm or final exam, or for changing an exam date. Students who believe they have an extenuating circumstance (e.g., health emergency) that warrants a change in the date/time of the final exam must speak directly with the Academic Dean. Students who do not show up for a midterm or final exam without such extenuating circumstances will receive a grade of 0, or "F".
 - Exam Accommodations: Students who have been approved for academic accommodations by the Disabilities Coordinator and who require either a separate testing environment and/or extra time for exams must arrange for these accommodations with the professor AT LEAST ONE WEEK prior to the exam. University policy states that is the responsibility of the student to contact the professor to arrange for accommodations, thus, any student who has not contacted the professor with one week of advanced notice to discuss accommodations will be expected to take the exam as scheduled with the rest of the class in the normal time and place allotted. The same policy applies to students who will miss an exam due to a mandatory class trip.
- LITERATURE REVIEW (20%): Students will be assigned a topic that represents a current issue, "conflict", or controversy that is being discussed and debated within the field of Child Development today. Each student will be assigned to one "side" or viewpoint of the controversy. Students will then write a Literature Review presenting the scientific research that supports the designated side of the issue. Instructions and grading rubric for the Literature Review will be discussed in class and made available on Blackboard.
 - The paper is due on 10 April 2018 during class time (12:30-13:45). Late papers will be graded according to the following policy:
 - 1-24 hours late: Reduction of one letter grade
 - 24-36 hours late: Reduction of two letter grades
 - More than 36 hours late: Automatic Failure of the assignment
- ORAL PRESENTATION/CLASSROOM DEBATE (10%): Following the literature review, students representing each side of an issue will form a group, and will prepare a brief presentation of the scientific literature that supports their side of the issue, using their literature reviews as a foundation for the argument. During class, each group will present their research, and the class will have a critical discussion/debate about the topic. More information will be provided on Blackboard regarding the requirements for the presentation.
