Objetivos de la asignatura

- Adquirir una visión panorámica de los principales movimientos literarios del siglo XIX y principios del siglo XX
- Conocer cómo se desarrollan corrientes literarias de origen europeo en la realidad social y literaria hispanoamericana

- Profundizar en la lectura de las novelas que abrirán camino a la gran novela hispanoamericana de mediados del siglo XX
- Conocer a algunos de los principales novelistas de la época mencionada
- Adquirir una visión integradora de la evolución de la novela hispanoamericana, desde finales del siglo XIX hasta las obras más conocidas de mediados del siglo XX
- Familiarizarse con la terminología propia del análisis y del comentario crítico de la novela
- Desarrollar el pensamiento crítico y mejorar la escritura reflexiva sobre la literatura, especialmente sobre la novela
- Dotar al alumno de los instrumentos críticos necesarios para las obras propuestas y para otras posibles lecturas

Descripción del curso

Para conseguir estos objetivos, se recurrirá a una variedad de actividades que el estudiante realizará durante y fuera de las horas de clase:

- a. Lectura cuidadosa de los textos principales, secundarios y de material de apoyo adicional.
- b. Discusión, análisis, ampliación de contenidos e intercambio de ideas durante la clase.
- c. Actividades creativas relacionadas con las obras leídas y las películas visionadas.
- d. Presentaciones orales.
- e. Un ensayo
- f. Dos exámenes.

Se espera de los estudiantes una participación activa y crítica con respecto a las lecturas (preguntas, comentarios, propuestas, interpretaciones, etc.).

Ampliación de cada uno de estos puntos:

➤ Participación y asistencia.

La puntualidad y la asistencia son obligatorias como parte de la nota final. Los retrasos sistemáticos (más de 10 minutos más de dos días) y las ausencias injustificadas (más de 2) bajarán gradualmente la nota de asistencia y participación (cada ausencia, un punto: de A a A-, a B+, etc.). Los estudiantes que no puedan asistir a una clase o realizar un examen (parcial o final) debido a enfermedad u otra razón válida deberán traer un **justificante escrito oficial (firmado y sellado), válido y aceptable** para retirar su ausencia o recuperar su examen. Los estudiantes que no se presenten a cualquiera de los exámenes con una excusa plenamente justificada serán penalizados.

La nota de participación se asigna según la **participación voluntaria** en la clase con corrección y adecuación, ya sea para responder, opinar, sugerir, comentar o involucrarse activamente en las actividades propuestas.

Es necesario que los estudiantes con necesidades especiales informen a la administración de la universidad de su situación al comenzar los cursos. Sólo con un informe de la Universidad se darán recursos de compensación.

➤ Presentación oral:

La presentación oral consiste en el resumen y el análisis de un artículo o en investigar sobre un tema que yo les propondré previamente. Los temas de las presentaciones estarán relacionados con las obras, los autores o con el contexto histórico y literario dentro del cual se han gestado. Los estudiantes deben preparar fotocopias del esquema de la presentación para repartir en la clase entre los demás estudiantes, el mismo día de la presentación. Este resumen de una página debe contener únicamente las ideas principales que se expondrán y las fuentes bibliográficas consultadas. Este esquema debe entregarse el mismo día de la presentación.

En el caso de los estudiantes de Máster, la presentación debe incluir una actividad pedagógica relacionada con la misma que involucre a los estudiantes. Esta actividad puede ser, por ejemplo, preparar una serie de preguntas de discusión o algo menos convencional y creativo. También tienen la opción de hacer un debate sobre algún punto o aspecto relacionado con su presentación.

Los estudiantes **NO pueden leer la presentación.** Tienen que practicarla de antemano para que dure el tiempo sugerido y pueda explicar sus ideas sin leer.

Duración: 8 a 10 minutos para **estudiantes subgraduados;** 15 minutos para **estudiantes graduados.**

Fecha: repartidas a lo largo del curso.

➤ Ensayo: sobre uno o dos de los textos leídos en clase. **Subgraduados:** 7-8 páginas.

Estudiantes del Máster: 10-12 páginas.
