To qualify for Active Duty employment consideration in the Navy Nurse Corps, you must meet the following requirements:

- Be a U.S. citizen
- Be a student or graduate in good standing of a U.S. education program granting a bachelor of science degree and accredited by the appropriate state board of nursing or the National League for Nursing
- Be licensed to practice in a U.S. state, the District
  of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico or a
  U.S. territory (new graduates must obtain a license
  within one year of beginning Active Duty service)
- Be willing to serve a minimum of three years of Active Duty
- Be between the ages of 18 and 42
- Be in good physical condition and pass a full medical examination
