Since portfolio reviews take place every year and student exhibitions take place every year, the studio art program can assess all learning outcomes on a yearly basis. The three to five year plan is to target the following goals:

- track majors more closely within exhibition participation numbers
- add a scale to select questions given for student responses on portfolio reviews
- compare 2940 portfolio review rubric score with 4940 portfolio review score per student

The assessment committee member from Studio Art is responsible for gathering and submitting the assessment data, in consultation with the rest of the Studio Art faculty, and is responsible for tracking the implementation of the assessment plan.

2. Please explain how these assessment efforts are coordinated with Madrid (courses and/or program)?

Studio Art does not currently offer a major in conjunction with the Madrid campus. Students taking studio classes in Madrid will include this work in portfolios for review and submit work in exhibitions. Therefore, this work will be included with the rest of the assessment data gathered.
